



Work-Study Helpful Information, Training Schedule and Positions

- To qualify to be a work-study:
 - you must be enrolled for the current semester
 - completed your FAFSA and been awarded Federal Pell
- Students wanting a work-study position for fall semester 2023 must take the “online training/orientation” or attend one of the classes listed below to apply for a position. This must be done every semester. It includes completing the work-study application and FERPA agreement. If you complete the online orientation, print and submit your score sheet to Financial Aid Department Office 169 in the JEK building. You must make an 80 or better on the end of orientation exam to qualify. Scores cannot be pulled up by the Financial Aid Office.
- All three forms listed below must be completed and submitted in order to be processed for a work-study position. Those taking the online orientation must obtain the application through their E'Trieve or Financial Aid Office.
 - Work-study Application
 - FERPA Agreement
 - Work-study Student Worker Agreement

- Work-study contracts must be signed prior to you starting work. See Ann Simmons in the Financial Aid office, room 169.
- Timesheets and Paychecks:
 - You will submit a paper timesheet to Ann Simmons once a week.
 - You must receive your paycheck through direct deposit.
 - You will receive \$12 per hour
- Completing the timesheet:
 - You will submit your time through the “Employee Self-Service” website in addition to submitting a computer generated timesheet (E'Trieve) to Financial Aid Department weekly.
 - Time is entered in 15 minute increments.
 - You may not work over six hours without showing/taking at least a 30-minute break.
 - Do not be late submitting your timesheet.
 - All pay issues/problems should be direct to the Human Resources Office in the Business Office.
- All work-study students must abide by FERPA guidelines. What is FERPA? The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 helps protect the privacy of student education records. The Act provides for the right to inspect and review education records, the right to seek to amend those records and to limit disclosure of information from the records. The intent of the legislation is to protect the rights of students and to ensure the privacy and accuracy of

education records. The Act applies to all institutions that are the recipients of federal aid administered by the Secretary of Education. www.ogeecheetech.edu/registrar-ferpa
